

Music Department

BGE MUSIC

In preparation for the start of the session the Music Department has had to be even more organised than they usually are!! As a department we were keen for our young people to experience Music in the usual way with practical experiences at the heart of our classrooms. For this to happen we created 'bubbles' of instruments, we are in a fortunate position at Mearns Academy with the resources we have and because of this we were able to avoid any sharing of instruments within an individual class. S1 have just completed a unit of work on tuned percussion and S2 on ukulele.

Unfortunately, we had to abandon our usual start to the term with S1 which would have included singing based on government guidance on aerosols. Where possible we have also had some young people bringing in their own instruments which has helped us greatly. Each classroom instrument has been labelled with a number and each number applies to an individual within each class for the duration of the unit.





From S3 upwards we have been able to allocate an

instrument and resources to each young person for sole use. This has meant that courses in S3 and upwards can continue as normal in preparation for Senior Phase and SQA qualifications.

Moving into Term Two I would like to encourage S1 pupils, if they have a guitar and/or ukulele to bring them into class during Music, again this will help to free up resources for those that need it. We have asked out S2 pupils to choose two instruments that they would like to specialise in for the remainder of the year and we will look to identify instruments for their sole use. Again, I would encourage parents/carers to discuss this choice with their child and if they have the instrument at home would ask them to bring this in if possible. Headphones will also be needed, across all year groups, and again would like to ask that pupils get used to popping a pair of headphones/earphones into their school bag on the days in which they have music.

BEEKEEPERS

Last years bee keeping class were very successful and we had 2 pupils complete all three units before lock down with a further 3 pupils completing at least the first unit in this qualification.

During the lockdown period our bees were very busy and produced over 25L of blossom honey. This was helped by the lockdown as there were lots of wild flowers growing in and around the school which would normally have been cut back with the grass. We currently have 3 of the school beehives in Glen Esk at the heather and we hope to have these back with approximately the same amount of honey again.

We have now started to sell the honey through our contact at 'The Spud Hut' on the Auchenblae to Fettercairn road. They were delighted to be in partnership with the school beekeepers and sales are going well. We will be using any profits we make to buy winter feed for the bees (yes we need to feed them when there are no flowers for them or if it is too cold for them to get out and about). We will also be investing in some more equipment and hives as we expand this course to allow more pupils the chance to participate in this activity.

This years swarm of pupils are already confidently opening up hives, checking that the bees have stores i.e. honey and nectar to feed their young as well as checking for diseases. We have also been practising catching and marking the queen bees, this was however performed on the male Drone bees just in case!

Over the coming weeks we will be preparing the hives for the winter ahead and looking forward to next spring.











HEALTH & LEISURE

Home Economics

It has been fantastic being able to welcome pupils back into the Home Economics Department and even better is the fact that all pupils will be able to take part in practical cookery activities from next term.

All pupils are expected to bring a suitable container (to take their food home in) and a clean apron; failure to do so may result in that child not taking part in practical activities. If you have any issues providing the above, then please contact the appropriate guidance teacher.

The first term has been busy and here is a summary of what each year group has been learning:

S1 - How to work safely and hygienically when preparing food. Pupils have also practiced washing dishes following the washing up routine - it would be fantastic if they were 'encouraged' to practice this at home. The washing up routine is available in Google Classrooms which all pupils have been asked to sign in to using the unique code for their class.

S2 - Food poisoning and how to prevent it, with a focus on bacterial growth and how to prevent it. Pupils have also learned about food spoilage bacteria and how they know if their food has been affected by it.

S3 - Pupils have been working extremely well on their REHIS Elementary Food Hygiene course. They are learning about bacteria, food poisoning, food and chemical storage and generally how to produce food safely in order to prevent food poisoning. They will sit a multiple choice exam next term and success will lead to a recognised National Qualification that is recognised by all food producers in Scotland good news for those looking for a part time job in a café, or similar.

S4/5/6 Practical Cookery - Pupils have had a busy term learning about cookery techniques and processes, food hygiene, food preparation techniques and effective knife skills using a vegetable knife and chef's knife. Practical lessons have seen the pupils being able to put the theory into practice and they should all be practicing their practical cookery skills at home as much as possible to help prepare for practical cookery assessments.

Physical Education

Throughout this term all PE has taken place outside and it's been fantastic to see pupils back in the department with a smile on their face. Our focus has very much been on the role sport and physical activity has to play as pupils return to school. The pupils have been brilliant and it's great to see everyone embracing our adapted curriculum and turning up to lessons with the appropriate kit. As we start to plan ahead to term 2 there's still a lot of uncertainty about when we will be allowed back inside for PE and also what activities we will be able to offer. Once the picture becomes clearer we will use our Mearns Academy Health & Leisure Facebook page along with school's social media accounts and email facilities to get this information home to parents/ carers. Until you hear otherwise pupils should continue to come to PE on the assumption that we will be working outdoors and as we approach the colder months it's imperative that pupils turn up with suitable clothing (jackets, hats, gloves, etc).

Extra Curricular

We are optimistic that we will be in a position to start our extra curricular sports clubs in term 2. We are in the process of working with Active Schools and further information will issued in due course. Keep a look out on our social media accounts for further information.

In ASL a group of pupils are organising an enterprise activity as part of their SQA Personal Development Award.

Using beeswax from our resident beehive the group have been busy making beeswax wraps. They have also been collecting wild flowers from the school garden to make pressed flower bookmarks. They are planning more products with a view to selling them all at a Christmas stall in the staffroom in November. All profits will go towards a new beehive for ASL! Appropriately, the group named themselves 'Love the Bees'.







MEARNS COMMUNITY LIBRARY

Since school started back in August, all of us in the library have been doing our best to meet pupils and support their reading and learning. Although public health guidelines have meant restricted physical access to the library for our school community, library staff are operating REQUEST + Collect for all pupils, a type of "personal shopper" service that lets us choose and

deliver a selection of books to individual pupils based on what they tell us they like to read. We've also been delivering book bundles to classrooms in the English Department, something that is great fun for us and makes books accessible for pupils.

All pupils and community library members have free access to Aberdeenshire's <u>digital library</u> of e-books, e-audiobooks, e-magazines and e-newspapers. Our new network librarian, Fiona, gave S1 - S3 pupils a demo of how to access and use the digital library along with pupils' log-in details. If parents and families want to use the digital library, you can join the library online. If you're already a member, <u>contact us</u> for a reminder of your log-in details.

To support learning, Fiona has been developing a wee website on Glow just for Academy pupils where you'll find online resources to support specific topics within year groups as well as some broader senior phase



research resource links and general study and revision skills links. We're also planning a Book Lovers' Reading Booth and will be adding pupil content to this. It's a developing, "watch this space" space!

Since late September we've also been the venue for an S1 lunch club twice a week, led by some of our S6 friends. Our lunch club provides a safe space for pupils to meet and socialise with games and activities.

Christmas Scholastic Book Fair

Our regular December Scholastic Book Fair is going online! Buy through our Scholastic Book Club and you can get your Christmas stocking fillers while doing something to benefit the school. For every £1 spent through our Book Club, Scholastic donates 20p in FREE books back to the school. The Club will be open for orders throughout November with delivery in December.
